There are a sizeable number of poems in Love Gestures, Love and Dejection, Love & Affection, Erotic Flames, and Dejected Versesdealing with the theme of love in its varying moods and aspects. Nazeer treats the theme of love in a unique and original way in a style characterized by simplicity. His love poems are based upon his personal love experiences. He also resorts to a variety of images to convey the idea of love in the best possible way. He creates mental pictures in his love verses, transporting the reader into the valley of love. His poetry is characterized by handsomeness, delicacy, deep human emotions, and magic. Nazeer (2023) claims that "I have wrestled with words, attempting to capture the elusive essence of human emotions. I have stood amidst the storm of inspiration, allowing it to wash over me and leave behind the inked trails of my heart" (p. iii). Nazeer in his poem, Couple focuses on permanent idea of love. A Desireextolls the theme of love in a placid and noise free atmosphere. Afraid focuses on fear of losing his beloved. Eid Mubarak uses a variety of images taken from the natural world to show poet's love for beloved. The poem First Romance is charged with a series of memories of first romance, offering a bundle of emotions related to pre romance, during romance phase, and post romance phase. Her Eyes beautifully praise the beloved's eyes portraying them as a window to the soul, brimming with beauty. Her Hair is a beautiful poem, painting the picture of the silky long hair of the beloved. Her Lips is a beautiful poem, portraying the enchanting beauty of the lips of the beloved. Love Poem paints the theme of love in an elegant manner. Love Song also offers a picture of the idea of love. It is a poem charged with nostalgic emotions. It is full of memories about the first time of seeing the shining, bright beauty of the beloved. Love Song also offers a picture of the idea of love. It is a poem charged with nostalgic emotions. The poet celebrates married love in his well-known poem Married First Night in a superb manner. In short, Nazeer's poetry is a pack of emotions navigating the theme of love in an elegant and superb manner by using a variety of images taken from the natural world. He showed love as strong and quick-moving while breaking cultural rules about how lovers should behave.

From Bronte's Wuthering Heights to Tolstoy's Anna Karenina, and Austen's Sense and Sensibility and Pride and Prejudice, we can find the theme of love in so many ways. These colorful stories show love as a deep, powerful, and sometimes sad thing. It changes people's actions in tales that charm everyone all around the world without any boundaries of time or culture. The theme of love in literature is a long-lasting main thing. It is a theme of many stories from different time periods, genres, and writers. It shows many different feelings from happiness to sadness. Love is a way to change ourselves. "Love was actually an invention of certain poets writing in eleventh century" (Hancock, 2007, p. 198). Stallworthy (1973) remarks that "feelings of passionate love' have

Trivedi (2023) focuses on the theme of love, sexuality, and female empowerment in the poems of Kamala Das who is a prominent Indian author. Her poetry is based on personal experiences and observations. It is steeped in strong emotions and her assertion of the significance of emotional connection. It shows rebellion against traditional gender roles. It is a powerful testament to self-assertion and identity exploration. It is a discourse on female sexuality in postcolonial Indian literature.

Aravind and Ravikumar (2018), doing a comparative analysis between the works of Das, and Dickinson, point out that despite cultural, temporal, and geographical differences, "Both the poets write on the theme of love with candor and sincerity" (p. 160). Their poetry is a poignant portrayal of failures in love, individualistic creative processes, and rebellion against cultural and social inhibitions. Their love poems show personal experiences. Both poets explore various facets of love, from physical desires to emotional agony.

Gashti (2020) focuses on Keats' early poems and letters through the lens of love providing a profound insight into the poet's philosophical and artistic journey. His poetry is based on personal connections and experiences with Fanny Brawne. In Keats' poetry love is both profound and transformative, extending beyond romantic relationships to encompass familial bonds and the interconnectedness of humanity. Keats treats love as a universal force in his poetry and letters. It is packed with elements of beauty, truth, and spiritual depth. Sensuousness is also a key element in his treatment of love.

Niraj (2020) explores the fundamental themes of love, life, and death Naidu's poetry. Naidu's poetry is highly musical, vibrant, and marked by spontaneity. "Love and death, though very much attempted themes, every writer deals independently and with originality" (p. 59). Naidu in her poetry often uses sensual imagery and emotional intensity to convey theme of love. His poetry's significant portion depicts love as surrender and sacrifice.

Various poets express love differently. Shelley sees it as a force everywhere, Byron links it to rebellion, and Keats connects it to beauty. Keats and the Romantic poets aim to reflect an ideal world that's beyond their grasp, presenting it in a way that feels beyond this earthly realm. Despite their attempts to idealize people, they reveal a paradox—a deep longing for eternal life within the human experience. Das, Dickinson, Keats, and Naidu capture the theme of love. These poets have contributed diverse perspectives on love, covering emotional depth, personal experiences, and the universality of emotion. However, in this existing research landscape, there seems to be a research gap concerning the contemporary poet Imran Nazeer. The research on Nazeer's poetry concerning the theme of love is notably scant.

THEORETICAL FRAMEWORK

Love is one of the strongest emotions in the world. It is a force which is always dynamic energetic and lively "Only love can heal the wounds of the past" (Hooks, 2000, p. xxviii). "Dictionary definitions of love tend to emphasize romantic love, defining love first and foremost as profoundly tender, passionate affection for another person, especially when based on sexual attraction". (Hooks, 2000, p. 3). Love is something which regulates and disciplines our activities. Life is dull and drab without love because it gives meaning, purpose and aim to life. "In the realm of the political, among the religious, in our families, and in our romantic lives, we see little indication that love informs decisions, strengthens our understanding of community, or keeps us together" (Hooks, 2000, p. xxvii)There exists a universal yearning to comprehend the essence of love: its significance, actionable steps in our daily existence to both give and receive love, and the means to entice those entrenched in a state devoid of love, encouraging them to embrace it by unlocking the doors to their hearts. "Everywhere we learn that love is important, and yet we are bombarded by its failure" (Hooks, 2000, p. xxvii).

Different scholars and intellectuals have attempted to define and interpret the power and worth of love. As Plato (2019), the revered philosopher, posited in his *Symposium*, love is depicted as a profound force that ignites the soul: "At the touch of love, everyone becomes a poet." "Love was not born out of poetry, then, but it may be the case that poetry was born out of love" (Hancock, 2007, p. 198). Shakespeare (1973), in his renowned work *Romeo and Juliet*, alludes to the paradoxical nature of this sentiment: "Love is a smoke raised with the fume of sighs; / Being purged, a fire sparkling in lovers' eyes" (p. 115). Fromm (2000) articulated the notion that love is not an innate or effortless occurrence but instead demands discipline, focused attention, perseverance, belief, and the transcendence of self-centered tendencies.

The concept of love is conveyed in different ways by different poets; Shelley envisages love as a universal force, Byron as revolt and Keats as beauty. Besides, Keats and other Romantic poets attempt to reflect an ideal world, which they cannot succeed in attaining in their material realm. Thus, they portray this ideal world at a transcendental level. Although Keats and his Romantic counterparts attempt to idealize human beings, they show a human paradox which displays the thirst to live forever. (Gashti, 2020, p. 92)

"Through the intricacies of language, [poet] endeavor[s] to give voice to the unspoken feelings that often linger within us, yearning to be heard and understood" (Nazeer, 2023, p. ii). Nazeer remarks that as a poet, "I have wrestled with words, attempting to capture the elusive essence of human emotions. I have stood amidst the storm of inspiration, allowing it to wash over me and leave behind the inked trails of my heart" (p. ii). Defining poetry Nazeer (2023) asserts that "In the hushed corridors of the heart, where silence speaks volumes and dreams whisper in the night, we embark on a poetic journey, an odyssey through the depths of emotion, introspection, and human experience" (p. iii).

To open our hearts more fully to love's power and grace we must dare to acknowledge how little we know of love in both theory and practice. We must face the confusion and disappointment that much of what we were taught about the nature of love makes no sense when applied to daily life. (Hooks, 2000, p. xxix)

He treats different forms of love including physical love, spiritual love, and conjugal love like Donne. Celebratingconjugal love in his poem *Couple* he claims that this type of love is permanent and everlasting. It goes on shining forever. It is the symbol of perfection. The married couple always stand by each other through thick and thin.

In the poem *Couple*, the love of the married couple is pure and everlasting. Their love shines through their eyes. "*Their hearts beat in the same sweet pace*" (p. 8). He eulogizes the couple's love in the following verses as:

Through thick and thin, they stand by each other

Their bond unbreakable, their love a wonder

In every moment, they find joy

As if every day was a brand new toy (p. 8)

Further, the poem *Couple* admires the laughter of the couple by likening it to a song flying in the air. Their laughter is like a "*melody that's been sung for so long*" (p. 9). Their dance is a perfect rhyme. The poet prays for the perpetuity of the love of the couple:

May their love always be as strong as now

And may it forever continue to shine bright,

somehow. (p. 9)

A Desire is an enchanting poem, extolling the theme of love. In this poem, the lover plans to love the beloved away from the noisy and hectic city life, in the lap of nature. The lover wants an atmosphere surrounded by the brightly shining stars and the whispering and calm moon. The lover wants a place dominated by placidity and tranquility. He wants a "place where our love can be free in a remote area, just you and me" (p. 11). The poet paints the idea in the following verses as:

Away from the city's busy crowd

Our passion will ignite, unbound

We'll feel the earth beneath us shake

As we make love with every breath we take (p. 9)

In the poem *Afraid*, the poet gives vent to his feeling of fear of losing his beloved. In fact, this poem is charged with feelings of apprehensions. The poet shows loss of optimism in every aspect. He is afraid of love, of loss, of loneliness, of others, afraid of pain, despair, depression, of destiny, of fate and of future as well.

Afraid to love... even a little...

Afraid to lose your love... or my ability to care... (p. 13)

Eid Mubarak also captures the theme of love. Here the poet uses a variety of images taken from natural world to show his love. Their love is ceaseless and eternal. They have "A bond so strong" that "no distance can destroy" (p. 18) this bond of love. The poet celebrates the special occasion of Eid with his beloved. Admiring the beloved'ssmile, he likens her smile to the moon that illuminates and "lights up my soul, in your embrace, I find comfort, feel whole" (p. 18). Their love is like a 'precious treasure' that "will forever shine" (p. 18).

The poem *First Romance* is charged with a series of memories of the first romance. The poem offers a bundle of emotions related to pre romance, during romance phase, and post romance phase. The preliminary step towards romance is full of heartbeat, embraces, "*gentle touch and tender kiss*". "*Our souls merge into purest bliss*" (p. 25). The poet captures the first scene of romance so elegantly in the following stanza:

Our passion ignited, flames so bright,

Our love an inferno, a stunning sight,

With every breath we took, we soared,

Our love, a journey to be adored. (p. 25)

In the poem *First Romance*, the poet recalls the occasion of first romance and says that their love sounds amazing and strong. During the first romance the poet and beloved were "The perfect match". The arrival of the sun in the morning saw them holding each other in close embrace. The first romance is still a fresh memory that will remain eternal:

Our first time, a memory to cherish,

Our romance, a love that will never perish. (p. 26)

In the poem *Her Eyes* the poet praises the eyes of the beloved by using a variety of images. The poem is full of beauty. The eyes of the beloved serve as a window to the soul. Her eyes are so enchanting and illuminating that go on "*Captivating me, drawing me near*" (p. 32). Her eyes tell a lot of stories "*With every blink, they sparkle anew, A sight that's simply too good to be true*" (p. 32). The poet likens her golden eyes to a precious treasure containing a pool of liquid gold. The poet is so immersed in the eyes of the beloved that with "*every glance, they steal my breath*" (p. 32). Her eyes are a source of life for the speaker. The poet claims:

Oh, how I long to gaze upon them more,

To lose myself in their eternal lore.

For in her eyes, I see a love so true,

A love that will forever be my muse. (p. 32)

Her Hair is a beautiful poem, painting the picture of the silky long hair of the beloved. The beloved's hairs are long "that shimmer and shine" (p. 33). Her hairs are "Whispering secrets in the breeze, A song of freedom, a melody to please" (p.33). Her hairs are full of beauty, and marvel. They are so beautiful that they look to be "a work of art" (p; 33). Eulogizing the wondrous beauty of the beloved's hair the poet says:

A cascade of colors, a tapestry of hues,

Golden locks and rich browns, blues and purples too,

Each strand a thread in a masterpiece,

Woven with grace and effortless ease. (p. 33)

Her Lips is a beautiful poem, portraying the enchanting beauty of the lips of the beloved. The speaker/ poet praises the beauty of the lips of his beloved, calling her lips pink, and "A precious gem that glitters like gold" (p. 34). Her lips are "Soft and supple, they invite a kiss" (p. 34). Her lips illuminate her smile "Like rose petals bathed in sunlight" (p. 34). The poet concludes the poem with a lot of praises for the beauty of the lips of the beloved:

Love Song also offers a picture of the idea of love. It is a poem charged with nostalgic emotions. It is full of memories about the first time of seeing the shining, bright beauty of the beloved. The poet says that "Our love was like a melody Playing sweetly, as we danced as one" (p. 61).

I know that we may never be

But I'll always hold on to the memory

Of the love we shared, so pure and true

I'll always cherish the moments with you (p.62)

Despite the beloved is gone from the life of the poet, the poet still goes on loving the beloved, the memories about her, and the ideas about her. He declares:

I'll always love you, forevermore

You'll always have a special place in my heart

And though we may be apart

I'll always hold on to the memories of our love. (p. 62)

The poet celebrates married love in his well-known poem *Married First Night* in a superb manner. The idea of married love is expressed passionately and elegantly by the poet. The poet still remembers that occasion that brought merriment, bliss and delight to his life. As a conventional lover the poet loves the eyes of beloved. He wants to dive deep into his beloved eyes. He remarks that, with his beloved, the future is full of hope and joy.

On this first night of our marriage,

I give you all of me,

My heart, my soul, my everything,

Forever yours to be. (p. 64)

She Was too mirroring the feeling of love sparked in the heart of the poet/ speaker at the site of beautiful women. The feeling of love aroused I the heart of the poet continues to be constant it works as a force which continues to change and haunt the poet. The poet is emotionally enthralled by the captivating beauty of the women. The women for whom the feeling of love develop in the poet's heart is a brave, fearless and bold women. The poet captures this moment in the following stanza as:

Here the poet describes Valentine's night focusing on the copulation of the lovers in a night surrounded by a serene, screen, and sequestered atmosphere. The lovers are engaged in love making in the beautiful and enchanting natural objects. They are in the company of nature. "The stars above shine bright and clear, As they gaze into each other's eyes" (p. 104). The poet captures the beauty of valentine night in the following verses as:

And as the night draws to a close,

They hold each other tight,

Feeling grateful for the love they share,

On this perfect Valentine's night. (p. 104)

You Will Be Mine shows the poet's hope to gain the love of the beloved. The poet hopes that one day or the other, he will be able to have his love. Moreover, he will continue to love her. Without her, the poet is nothing because the company of the beloved makes him perfect, and the whole. The poet hopes:

For one day you will be mine,

And all my love will finally shine. (p. 108)

The poet captures the significance, worth and value of love in the poem entitled *Fire of Love*. The poet is introspective in his love. He tries to give vent to this feeling but eventually fails. Journey of Love is a difficult poem to understand. It too talks about the power of love in figurative language. The opening of the poem is amazing:

Let's journey, my love, to the ocean's embrace,

To the sea of love, our hearts' special place.

I'll share my devotion, words whispered true,

From the day we crossed paths, my love, I knew. (p. 37)
